## From the Pastor's Heart by Pastor David Nuottila

During a recent session of Wednesday morning Bible study, our small group read the account written by Luke in the book of Acts, of the time when God poured out his Holy Spirit upon all those who were gathered in the upper room. Peter was there, along with the remaining apostles, Jesus' mother, and nearly 120 other witnesses to the resurrection of Jesus. They were in the room together worshipping God and praying. That's when it happened.

A sudden sound of a mighty rushing wind filled the room just as tongues of fire danced over the heads of the faithful. God's Holy Spirit made his entry into the lives of those who would build the Church of Jesus Christ. What happened next is nothing short of astounding.

Peter, and the remaining disciples of Jesus took to the streets of Jerusalem and began proclaiming the good news of salvation through Jesus Christ. They did it in many languages, even though none of them had knowledge or training in the tongues in which they spoke. It was God's working of a miracle so that people would know the power of the death and resurrection of Jesus, the true Paschal Lamb who takes away the world's sin. Scripture records that 3,000 people were added to the church on that day, and in the next few days, another 5,000 were added to the number of believers in Christ.

Reading this narrative of the birth of the Church of Christ, and then considering the recent history of the Church, one might get the sense that the Holy Spirit no longer moves among the faithful. This would be a completely false statement. The power of the Holy Spirit is unchanging. It is the same today as it has always been since the beginning. What has changed, however; is humanity's response to the power of the Holy Spirit.

The powers in the air, as Paul puts in Ephesians (*Ephesians 2:2-4*), continue to lull Christians into a spiritual slumber, of which they find it difficult to awaken from. We at St. Jacob's are no better off than many congregations when it comes to a lack of response to the Holy Spirit's calling. There appears

to be a condition of spiritual lethargy permeating the lives of congregations throughout the Church.

During the recent Mission Region Convocation, I was a part of a conversation among several pastors who compared notes about the goings on within our churches. We soon discovered we are walking on common ground. There seems to be little hunger within several of our churches for Spiritual growth. Bible study attendance is at an all time low, as is Sunday School attendance. Participation in mission projects seems lacking and worship attendance among young families is becoming a rarity in many places. We all scratched our heads and wondered what the cause of these trends might be.

One thing we realized is that, as it was in the upper room, the people of God do not seem to gather in large numbers for prayer. Prayer seems to be something we turn to when we want something or have a particular difficulty. Christians today do not seem to be plugged in to the available power of the Holy Spirit God provides. Instead, we tend to listen to those "powers in the air" and our faith becomes distracted. This spiritual lethargy causes congregations to shrink within themselves and experience decreasing joy as numbers of worshipers begin to dwindle.

It is my prayer for St. Jacob's that we would make a strong commitment to living a life together in the power of the Holy Spirit. That we would experience increased life together in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, and that we would rediscover the joy and fruitfulness of reading Scripture with one another as a community of believers. May the God who first brought forth the Lord Jesus Christ from death and the grave give us the will and the desire to do these.

We will encourage one another, talk about confusing passages and use some guided questions to facilitate conversation and learning more about what we have read. A brochure is located on the table in the church nave adjacent to the offering plates. It contains information about what to expect as we take up the challenge to read the Bible in 90 days. The cost is \$10.00 for a pound of BBQ and \$8.00 for a quart of hash.

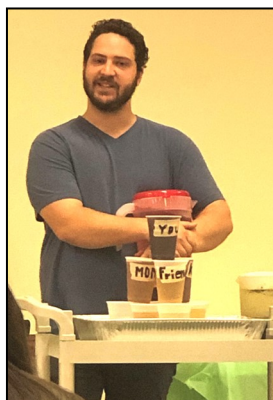

## MID-WEEK BIBLE STUDY

Mid-Week Bible Study continues in the Fellowship Hall each Wednesday morning at 10 AM. We are reading the book of Acts and learning more about the birth of the Church of Jesus Christ and the men whom Christ chose to establish it. No previous study is required, and the lessons are presented in such a way that it really doesn't matter if you are joining in at the middle of our study or if you have attended each week. We have a very lively discussion and look forward to more church family members joining. (We will not have class on June 1<sup>st</sup> while Pastor is on vacation.)

## CAROLINA MISSIONS REGION CONVOCATION

Going to the Carolinas Mission Region Convocation is a lot like going to a family reunion. You get to see and catch up with people that you have not seen for a while. Along those lines, it was Pastor Marty Ramey and Pastor Dawn Rister. Also like a family reunion, the host congregation provides the evening meal on Friday night, this year it was bar-b-que and smoked turkey. However, unlike most family get togethers, there is some business that must be attended to.

This year there were four items that needed to be voted on:

- Approval of the budget for next year-it was approved as presented by the Treasurer and Finance Team.
- Minor corrections to the CMR Constitution (mostly substituting "CMR" for "Carolinas Mission Region")-this was also approved.
- Disbursement of unused funds in this year's budget (estimated to be about twenty thousand dollars). The unused funds will be split among the CMR Ministry Partners.
- For the South Carolina Mission District, we needed to elect a lay person to serve on the Executive Committee. Larry Shull, whose previous term was expiring, was re-elected.
- Lastly, for the South Carolina Mission District, there is a proposal to get together a group to go to Kentucky sometime in the late summer early fall in coordination with NALC Disaster Relief to continue efforts rebuilding after tornados struck late last year.

Bishop Selbo gave the sermon at the opening Worship Service, and set the tone for the need to make Disciples and then go out and make other Disciples. After Worship Service, Rev. Dr. David Wendel introduced some new tools to help congregations to that end. The first is a study guide/book, Life-to-Life Discipleship, that was in the works for a long time. You can get an electronic copy of it off the NALC website. Also, he spoke about a new tool that is available to all congregations that provides a demographic, political, and lifestyle overview of people living within a fifteen minute drive of the congregation. This tool allows for better informed and targeted outreach programs.

The Lutheran Men (Bruce), Lutheran Women, and Youth Director (Melina Corn) all gave reports about their accomplishments over the last year. There was also a question and answer session with Bishop Selbo, Rev. Dr. David Wendel, and the new Assistant to the Bishop, Pastor Bill White. Mary Bates with NALC Disaster Relief gave a report about their ongoing mission.

Lutheran Family Services of the Carolinas showed a video about their work with people that have had traumatic brain injuries. Sola Publishing had a large display showing off some of their available books. Lutheran Military Veterans and Family Ministries related their ongoing efforts helping returning veterans and their families through consoling and other charity work. They even brought one of their therapy dogs, "Patrick Dooly".

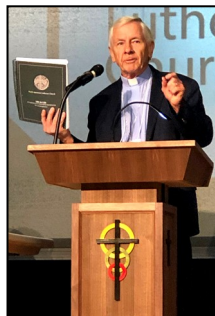
NALC partners in Global Missions gave presentations about their ministry and how to get involved.

As a quick overview, these included our own Pastor Nuottila representing Congo Mission International, and Pastor Heidi Punt representing SMI Haiti. Awakening Lives to World Missions (ALWM) primarily works in Asia and helps churches in the states begin or revitalize their global mission efforts. India Transformed works to educate the poor and lowest caste in India, while walking a thin line due to government restrictions on evangelization. Lastly, The Spiritual Orphans Network (SON) ministers to those that live in Eastern Europe and are lacking in Christian support due to the legacy of religious purges and militant atheism of the Soviet Union. Currently, they are

focused on the ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine. I have included links to the ministry partner websites below if you would like to learn more about them. Also, if you would like to go next year, just let the Council know. Anyone can attend, even though we need only one lay delegate.
