Pastoral Devotion for March – You are Dust

Read Psalm 51

Remember, you are dust. As if we need a reminder. You are dust, and there is nothing you can do about it. To dust you shall return. This has been the case ever since Adam and Eve took a bite from the forbidden fruit. From that time on, all people have had to face the fact that we are indeed sinners and sinners cannot save themselves. You are dust, and to dust you shall return. Still, there is hope.

Centuries before Christ was born, King David, of all people, stood convicted in his sin. Just like everyone else, King David was dust. David knew there was nothing he could do to merit salvation. Mercy could only come from the God whom he grievously disobeyed. And so, in his guilt and shame, he bore his heart to God.

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a

right spirit within me. Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation and uphold me with a willing spirit. (Psalm 51:10-12).

David's prayer is our prayer too. Only through Christ are we saved. Even as we are dust, through God's grace, mercy and love, Christ extends the promise of God's kingdom to all who believe. Because Christ died the death we deserve, all who are baptized and believe will be raised from the dust of the earth and receive eternal life with God in his kingdom of glory.

Prayer: Thank you for your mercy and grace, O God of my salvation. Amen.



Into the Liturgy, part 6

The Great Thanksgiving

The words we say in preparation for receiving the eucharist (Holy Communion) are often called "The Great Thanksgiving." These words remind us of what God has done and continues to do for us through Christ Jesus. The Great Thanksgiving begins with a call and response called the "Sursum Corda" from the Latin words for "Lift up your hearts." It is an ancient part of the liturgy since the very early centuries of the Church's call to worship. These words remind us that when we celebrate Holy Communion, we are to do so with thankful and joyful hearts.

Proper Preface

The next item within our liturgy is spoken by the clergy and is called "The Proper Preface." The church's liturgical year is divided into six seasons; Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost. The Sundays of each season are known as the "Propers." The Proper Preface is the seasonal prayer preceding the celebration of the Sacrament. It has optional words that connect to the particular day or season of the church year and recognizes the unity of all believers for all time as we receive a foretaste of the heavenly banquet that has no end.

From Your Pastor's Heart

"Likewise, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words." Romans 8:26

Every now and then I mention to folks that I love reading books by Henri J.M. Nouwen. Nouwen, a spiritual leader of the church, was someone who embodied the loving spirit of Christ in all his actions and deeds. One of my favorite devotional books written by Nouwen is his yearlong journal he kept entitled *Bread for the Journey*. In this book are the reflections that Henri jotted down each day for an entire year and then published them as a guide to help those who desire to live a spiritual life. The following is an excerpt from the book.

Prayer is the gift of the Spirit. Often, we wonder how to pray, when to pray, and what to pray. We can become very concerned about methods and techniques of prayer. But finally, it is not we who pray but the Spirit who prays in us.

Paul says: "The Spirit ... comes to help us in our weakness, for, when we do not know how to pray properly, then the Spirit personally makes our petitions for us in groans that cannot be put into words; and God who sees into all hearts knows what the Spirit's deep sighs mean because the prayers that the Spirit makes for God's holy people are always in accordance with the mind of God" (Romans 8:26-27). These words explain why the Spirit is called "the Consoler."

Sometimes, when being alone in prayer it can be difficult to articulate one's feelings in the form of well composed and carefully chosen words. All too often, when we try to put thoughts together in a logical order so as to pray a meaningful prayer, the result is time spent concentrating on the words of the prayer instead of simply following the Holy Spirit's lead and enjoying quiet time with God. Martin Luther teaches us that it is best to use simple language. Luther once said, "The fewer the words, the better the prayer." This captures the essence of our need for meaningful prayer as we are led by the Holy Spirit in sacred communication with God.

When we approach our heavenly Father in prayer, we come as needy people; unworthy sinful people

who cannot approach God without the help of the Holy Spirit. It is by the Spirit's power that we are enabled to meet God on such an intimate level. We must understand that it's not the words of our prayer that God receives with joy; rather, he knows our hearts and receives our prayers as faithful response to the gifts of the Spirit. In prayer, God receives us, the totality of our very being. Through prayer we enjoy communion with the God who first created us, no matter how unworthy our words seem to be.

This Lenten season, one particular spiritual discipline I strongly urge our congregation to engage in is living a life dedicated to prayer.

Learning to pray aright, understanding that in difficult times, your words do not matter, for the Holy Spirit will intercede for you with sighs too deep for words (Romans 8:26-28). What matters is that we follow the example of Jesus, spend time alone with God in prayer, and lift up before him the things that weigh on our hearts and minds.

Living a life of prayer also means offering our thanks and praise to God at all times and in all situations. Our heavenly Father is generous beyond human measure, and even in difficult times his mercy and grace endure. For the love we receive, for the support of family and friends, for the air that we breathe and the food we eat, we give thanks for the many and wonderful blessings of our Father who meets our every need.

Loving Father, we give you thanks for the gifts of your Holy Spirit that we may come to you in prayer. Continue to bless us with these gifts, and help us to be a blessing to others that they too may realize the power of prayer. We humbly pray for this and all that you see as good for us, through the precious name of our Savior and Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Ash Wednesday - March 5th

The beginning of our Lenten Journey to Good Friday begins on March 5th with our traditional Ash Wednesday service. The imposition of the ashes is our spiritual reminder that we are indeed sinful creatures in need of a Savior. Ashes imposed in the shape of the cross is our reminder that we indeed have one in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. Divine Services on Ash Wednesday will begin at 7:00 PM and include the celebration of Holy Communion. Please invite your friends and neighbors to join us during the season of Lent as we make our pilgrimage to the cross and ultimately the empty tomb of our Lord Jesus. Ashes will be prepared on Shrove Tuesday by the burning of last year's palms from Palm Sunday. If you still have your dried palm branch, please bring it to add to the fire.



Worship During the Season of Lent

During the Sundays in Lent, our Sunday preaching theme will feature a sermon series entitled "The Body of Christ." This series will help us reflect on the humanity of our Lord Jesus and explore the totality of his sacrifice for the forgiveness of our sin. Beginning on March 9th, the five Sundays in Lent will focus on the following themes, March 9th, The Mouth of Christ; March 16th, The Hands of Christ; March 23rd, The Feet of Christ; March 30th, The Eyes of Christ; April 6th, The Heart of Christ. The series concludes on Maundy Thursday, April 17th with the theme "The Blood of Christ." I pray you will find each sermon truly inspiring and reflective as we make our annual Lenten Journey together.

Our Midweek Lenten series will once again feature dramatic readings given by several of our church family members. Five Lives, Five Stories provides a fresh look at Jesus's final hours as witnessed by five people who had contact with Jesus upon his arrest, trial, and crucifixion. Worship on the Wednesdays of Lent will begin at 7:00 PM. The liturgical setting for our services will be the Lutheran Book of Worship Vespers. Note, Holy Communion is not celebrated as part of the liturgical movement of Vespers.

Lenten Bible Reading Challenge

Daily Scripture reading is one of the hallmarks of discipleship. Developing such discipline is what the season of Lent is all about – moving away from worldly endeavors and striving for the kingdom of God. During the season of Lent (this year from March 5th – April 19th) the challenge for our congregation is to read the four Gospels in this season of penitence and reflection. Within the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) there are 89 chapters. Through the season of Lent (minus Sundays) there are 40 days in which to read. Each Sunday during the challenge is a day in which you may take a break from your devotional reading to attend worship.

Taking up this challenge, you will read the entire narrative of Jesus' ministry and victory over sin, death, and the power of the devil. Plan to take up this challenge and develop a healthy habit of Scripture reading that will carry you throughout your days. Copies of the reading plan are available in the church narthex.

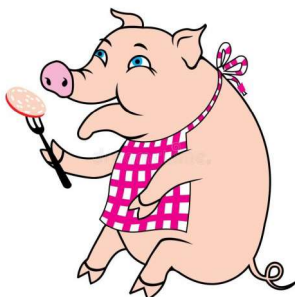
